January 25 – February 5, 2017



Don't miss this opportunity to spend 10 days birding in Panama with Kenn and Kim Kaufman! We'll visit the famous Canopy Tower and then go to the Canopy Family's newest property, Canopy Camp in the Darién Province.

Itinerary Overview

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Detailed Itinerary

January 25: Arrival & Orientation

Welcome to Panama! You will be met at the airport and then driven to the Canopy Tower, nestled in the heart of Soberania National Park along the famous Panama Canal. Upon arrival to the Tower, you will want to immediately have your binoculars and cameras ready as hummingbirds buzz around the feeders in the parking lot. You'll also quickly learn that birds, sloths, monkeys, and butterflies are visible outside every window! As our staff takes your luggage to your rooms, we invite you up to the third floor for a cold drink, and then without wasting any time, go up to the observation deck overlooking the vast rainforest! Keel-billed Toucan, Green Honeycreeper, and Palm Tanager may be nearby and (if we're lucky) a King Vulture or Black Hawk-Eagle might be visible in the distance! Before dinner, we'll meet with our guide and hear an introduction to the Tower and overview of the next few days to come while enjoying a drink and appetizers. Dinner at Canopy Tower.

Our special guests for this tour, Kenn and Kim Kaufman, are eager to share their knowledge and passion for birds and wildlife throughout the tour. In the evenings, we can gather to hear their tales of travels and birds, and on some days see the sketches and drawings that Kenn has worked on.

January 26: Observation Deck, Semaphore Hill Road & Chagres River

This morning we won't be able to resist getting up at dawn, as the Mantled Howlers roar in the distance. From the observation deck with a hot cup of coffee or tea in hand, we will watch the mist rise from the valleys surrounding the tower as the morning bird activity starts. Red-ored and Mealy parrots fly over the valleys and Scaled Pigeons perch in the treetops. Up close, Golden-hooded, Palm, and Plain-colored tanagers, Fulvous-vented Euphonias, and Green Honeycreepers feed in the cecropia trees next to the Tower. Green Shrike-Vireo, Squirrel Cuckoo, Black-cheeked and Cinnamon woodpeckers, Masked Tityra, Black-breasted Puffbird, Cocoa Woodcreeper, and many others may be visible. We will scan the distant treetops for Blue Cotinga, Gray-headed Kite, and Crane Hawk. It is the start of hawk migration season, so keep an eye out for migrating Mississippi Kites, Turkey Vultures, Broad-winged and Swainson's hawks.

After a delicious hot breakfast, we will meet at the hummingbird feeders, where White-necked Jacobin, White-vented Plumeleteer, Long-billed Hermit, and Blue-chested and Violet-bellied hummingbirds feed at the nectar feeders. This morning, we will walk slowly down Semaphore Hill Road, scanning the understory of the forest and the canopy above for forest birds, raptors, and anything else we may come across. Great Tinamou, White-whiskered Puffbird, Rufous and Broad-billed Motmots, Black-faced Antthrush, Red-capped and Blue-crowned Manakins, White-shouldered Tanager, Crimson-crested Woodpecker, White-breasted Wood-Wren, Black-bellied Wren, Slate-colored Grosbeak, Black-crowned and Fasciated Antshrikes, Dot-winged,

Checker-throated and White-flanked Antwrens and many other understory species will hopefully be encountered. Collared Forest-Falcon, Black Hawk-Eagle, Double-toothed Kite, and Semiplumbeous Hawk are all possibilities for this morning! Lunch at the Canopy Tower.

Once lunch is over, we will have some time to relax, have a siesta in a hammock, or enjoy the swifts and raptors on the observation deck. We will meet again mid-afternoon and board the “rainforest mobile”, Canopy Tower’s special birding vehicles. The grounds of the Gamboa Rainforest Resort, along the mighty Chagres River, host a wide diversity of avian life. Open roads, fields, wetlands, riverside, and forest will keep our eyes watching birds all afternoon. Here we will look for Southern Lapwing, Great Kiskadee, Black-headed Saltator, Buff-breasted Wren, Great Antshrike, Gartered Trogon, Scrub Greenlet, Flame-rumped Tanager, Red-crowned and Black-cheeked Woodpeckers, Thick-billed Euphonia, Orange-chinned Parakeet, Yellow-rumped Cacique, Gray-headed Chachalaca, Clay-colored Thrush, and Collared Aracari. Along the riversides, we will scan for Common and Purple Gallinules, Striated Heron, and Mangrove Swallows, among many others! We will head back to the tower to review our checklist for the day and enjoy a nice dinner.

January 27: Pipeline Road

Today is an early morning as we head off to the world famous Pipeline Road! This road is surrounded on all sides by mature lowland forest and is home to over 500 species of birds. As we walk the gravel road, we will scan for White-bellied, Dusky, and Chestnut-backed Antbirds, Slaty-tailed, White-tailed, and Black-throated Trogons, Whooping Motmot, White-necked Puffbird, Southern Bentbill, Golden-collared Manakin, Gray-chested Dove, Cinnamon Woodpecker, Yellow-throated Toucan, Black-striped Woodcreeper and if we’re lucky to come across an army ant swarm, Bicolored and Ocellated Antbirds, Gray-headed Tanager, and Song Wren. This is one of the best places to find Pheasant Cuckoo and Rufous-vented Ground-Cuckoo as well! We will enjoy a delicious picnic lunch with the birds in the heart of the forest, miles down Pipeline Road. For this afternoon, we will continue further down Pipeline Road, into Caribbean slope forest, where we hope to find dozens more birds, including Russet-winged Schiffornis, Spot-crowned Antvireo, Moustached Antwren, Streak-chested Antpitta, Black-faced Anthrush, Slaty-backed Forest-Falcon, White-breasted Wood-Wren, Purple-throated Fruitcrow and Black Hawk-Eagle! We will cross some forest streams, scanning them for elusive stream birds such as Agami Heron, Sunbittern, and Green-and-rufous Kingfisher. No doubt it will be an adventurous and memorable day on Pipeline Road.

On the way back to the tower, we can stop at the Ammo Dump Ponds along the Panama Canal. This large lagoon supports a nice diversity of bird life, including Rufescent Tiger-Heron, Little Blue Heron, Green and Ringed Kingfishers, Greater Ani, Wattled Jacana, Purple Gallinule, Osprey, Snail Kite, and White-throated Crake as well as American Crocodile and Lesser Capybara. We will scan the edges for Crimson-backed Tanager, Streaked Saltator, Black-striped Sparrow, and three species of seedeaters. After a full and exciting day of birding, we will return back to the tower, where a scrumptious meal awaits us!

January 28: Metropolitan Natural Park and Summit Ponds/Old Gamboa Road

We will awake as the howler monkeys roar in the distance. After an early breakfast, we board the van for Metropolitan Natural Park, a reserve located in the heart of Panama City. This Pacific dry forest is home to a wide variety of birds and wildlife. As we walk the trails, we will look for some of the dry forest specialties that can be found here, including Yellow-bellied and Lesser Elaenias, Rufous-breasted and Rufous-and-white Wrens, Lance-tailed Manakin, Rosy Thrush-Tanager, Collared Forest-Falcon, Southern Beardless-Tyrannulet, Yellow-crowned and Paltry Tyrannulets, the endemic Yellow-green Tyrannulet, Golden-fronted Greenlet, Yellow-backed Oriole, Yellow-crowned Euphonia, and Streaked Saltator. It is also a great place to find Geoffroy’s Tamarin, Central American Agouti, and Hoffmann’s Two-toed Sloth. After our morning at the park, we will head back to the Canopy Tower for lunch.

There will be some time after lunch to watch the hawk migration on the observation deck or take a siesta in a hammock, and by mid-afternoon we’ll be ready to go birding again! This afternoon we’ll head down the road to nearby Summit Ponds and Old Gamboa Road. Our first stop will be at the Summit Ponds—two small lagoons surrounded by forest which attract Green, Amazon, Ringed, and American Pygmy kingfishers, Gray-necked Wood-Rail, Capped Heron, Black-bellied Whistling-Ducks, Greater Ani, Lesser Kiskadee, and Great Black-Hawk. The original road to the town of Gamboa is now a wide foot trail that extends through open tall-grass field and forest edges. Here we hope to find Barred Antshrike, Thick-billed Seed-Finch, Pale-eyed Pygmy-Tyrant, Red-throated Ant-Tanager, Yellow-billed Cacique, Rufous-breasted and Plain Wrens, Lance-tailed

Manakin, Jet Antbird, Long-billed Gnatwren, Rufous-capped Warbler, Rosy Thrush-Tanager, Blue-black Grosbeak, and Chestnut-headed Oropendola. We will also check a known roost for Spectacled Owl along the road!

January 29: Cerro Azul & Cerro Jefe

Today is an exciting day! We will start our day very early, but it will be worth it as we head up to the foothills and highlands east of Panama City! A completely new suite of birds awaits us at Cerro Azul (2500 ft.) and Cerro Jefe (3300 ft.). In these cloud-laden highlands, we will explore the forest trails and edges for new species, including Black-and-yellow, Emerald, and Speckled Tanagers, White-vented Euphonia, Yellow-eared Toucanet, Black-and-white Hawk-Eagle, Black-eared Wood-Quail, Spotted Woodcreeper, Russet Antshrike, and the endemic Stripe-cheeked Woodpecker! It is hummingbird heaven here – we could see up to 17 species including Bronze-tailed Plumeleteer, Rufous-crested Coquette, White-tipped Sicklebill, and Violet-capped Hummingbird. We will have lunch at a lovely residence overlooking the vast Chagres National Park, and continue birding through the early afternoon to search for even more great species! We will make our way back to the Canopy Tower in time to freshen up before dinner and review our growing list of birds.

January 30: Nusagandi Forest Reserve & arrival at the Canopy Camp

We will pack up early and after breakfast at the Canopy Tower, we will embark for Darién, making several stops along the way for birding of course! Heading east along the Panamerican Highway, we will scan the fields for Southern Lapwing, Savanna Hawk, and Crested Caracara. We will take a well-worthy detour off the highway onto the El Llano-Carti Road, where we cross the Continental Divide and head into the foothills of the San Blas Mountains to Nusagandi, where lush humid Caribbean slope forest, full of new species awaits! Our main target here is the enigmatic Sapayoa, which lives along the creeks through these forests. Along the forest trails and in the open areas we will search for Sulphur-rumped, Rufous-winged, and Black-and-yellow Tanagers, White-eared Conebill, Black-and-white Hawk-Eagle, Slate-throated Gnatcatcher, the endemic Stripe-cheeked Woodpecker, Blue-fronted Parrotlet, and Tawny-capped Euphonia. Carrying on along the highway, we will stop again along the shores of Bayano Lake and scan the edges for Cocoi Heron, Neotropical Cormorant, Pied Water-Tyrant, Ruddy-breasted Seedeater, and the rare Bare-throated Tiger-Heron. A small trail leading from the water's edge is a good place to try for Black Antshrike, Golden-collared Manakin, and Rufous-winged Antwren. At Rio Mono Bridge, we hope to find One-colored Becard, Black-headed Tody-Flycatcher, Blue Ground-Dove, Blue Cotinga, Orange-crowned Oriole, Pied Puffbird, and more. We will scan the river below for Green-and-rufous Kingfisher and Fasciated Antshrike.

We will stop to stretch our legs and have a delicious Panamanian lunch in Torti, just before the Darien Province border. The busy hummingbird feeders here attract Scaly-breasted and Snowy-bellied Hummingbirds, Long-billed Starthroat, and other common species. Then from here, we head to the Canopy Camp, arriving before dusk. Upon arrival, we will be shown to our tents and have some time to freshen up before dark, when we will meet in the lounge for appetizers, cocktails, and dinner! We will settle into our tents after a long day, and doze off to the sounds of the forest around us.

January 31: “Nando’s Trail” & Birding the Panamerican Highway to Yaviza

Yellow-throated and Keel-billed Toucans sound a morning chorus from the towering Cuipo trees beside the camp. Step out of your tent to a spectacular view of Darién! We will meet our guide early in the clearing and start birding! Chestnut-headed Oropendola, Black-crowned Tityra, Pale-bellied Hermit, Barred Puffbird, Olivaceous Piculet, White-headed Wren, Ruddy Pigeon, Black-tailed Trogon, Rufous-tailed Jacamar, Spot-crowned Barbet, Yellow-breasted Flycatcher, and Sooty-headed Tyrannulet can be found around the camp open areas. After breakfast in the open-air dining room, we will spend the morning birding “Nando’s Trail”, a wide, loopy trail through the mature secondary growth forest beside the camp! We will seek out Royal Flycatcher, Black Antshrike, Slaty-backed Forest-Falcon, Tiny and Semiplumbeous Hawks, Great Potoo, Gray-cheeked Nunlet, White-fronted Nunbird, Double-banded

Graytail, and Russet-winged Schiffornis. Golden-collared and Golden-headed Manakins lek throughout these woods! Lunch at Canopy Camp.

There is plenty of time for a siesta in the early afternoon during the hottest part of the day. We will reconvene again to continue birding this fantastic part of Panama! In the afternoon we will drive to the very end of the Panamerican Highway, scanning and stopping for birds along the road. Here we will search for various regional specialties and other fascinating species including Black Oropendola, Black Antshrike, Spectacled Parrotlet, Rufous-tailed Jacamar, Laughing Falcon, Pearl Kite, and Black-collared Hawk. Marshy roadsides along the highway are a great place to find Pied Water-Tyrant, Ruddy-breasted Seedeater, Yellow-hooded Blackbird, Limpkin, and more. Arriving at the end of the highway, the bustling frontier town of Yaviza will give us a feel for daily life in the Darien. The cemetery in town is a great place to look for tanagers, motmots, and flycatchers, and Bicolored Wrens have recently nested here. After a cold drink and a snack, we will head back to the Camp. Dinner at Canopy Camp.

After dinner, we will grab our spotlight and search the grounds for owls and other nocturnal wildlife. Central American Pygmy-Owl, Tropical Screech-Owl, Spectacled, Black-and-white, Mottled, and Crested Owls, and Common and Great Potoos may be heard and we'll try our best to call them in. Nocturnal mammals are common here, and we'll scan for eyeshine of Kinkajou, Olingo, Western Night Monkey, and Central American Woolly Opossum, among others!

February 1: El Salto Road & Aruza Lagoons/Las Lagunas Road

We will awake for an early breakfast just after dawn as the birds start their morning chorus. Then we'll board the Canopy Camp's birdmobile and head to El Salto Road. This 6-km long road extends northeast off the Panamerican Highway and for the first 2 kilometers, is bordered by mature secondary forest. Here we will scan the roadsides and forest for Orange-crowned Oriole, Blue Cotinga, Crane Hawk, Golden-green Woodpecker, Double-banded Graytail, Black-breasted Puffbird, White-eared Conebill, and Blue-and-yellow and Chestnut-fronted Macaws. Harpy Eagle has even been seen here! At the end of the road, we will walk a short trail through a dense thicket in hopes of finding Bare-crowned Antbird, Pale-bellied Hermit, Bay Wren (eastern Panama race), Olivaceous Piculet, Streak-headed Woodcreeper, and more. Lunch at Canopy Camp.

We have a full afternoon of birding ahead of us as we explore the open fields and roadside thickets of Las Lagunas Road, ending at the Aruza Lagoons. This wonderful matrix of habitats attracts a great diversity of birds, including Giant Cowbird, Spot-breasted Woodpecker, Chestnut-fronted Macaw, Little Cuckoo, White-headed Wren, Rufescent Tiger-Heron, Red-breasted Blackbird, Yellow-breasted and Dark-billed Flycatchers, Greater Ani, Muscovy Duck, Striped Cuckoo, and other open area birds. White-eared Conebill, Great Antshrike, and Gray-cheeked Nunlet are also possibilities here along the scrubby roadsides. We will try to call for Dwarf and Gray-capped Cuckoos at a small patch of forest. The Aruza Lagoons is large wetland bordered by cattle farms, where we will hopefully find Black-capped Donacobius, Yellow-hooded Blackbird, Gray-breasted Crake, Pied Water-Tyrant, Capped Heron, and Amazon and Green-and-rufous Kingfishers. As dusk approaches, we will make our way back to the Canopy Camp for cocktails and dinner.

February 2: Nuevo Vigia Embera Village

Today we have a full day of natural and cultural exploration! After an early breakfast at the Canopy Camp, we head towards the town of Las Peñitas. There we will grab our gear and board dugout canoes called "piraguas," and start our journey along the Chucunaque River to Nuevo Vigia, an Embera village nestled north of the Panamerican Highway. Along the river, we will scan for Green Ibis, Yellow-backed and Yellow-tailed Orioles, Crested and Black Oropendolas, Chestnut-fronted Macaw, Ringed, Amazon, and Green kingfishers, Gray-lined Hawk, and other riverside birds. We will turn up the Turquesa River and stop at a known spot for Dusky-backed Jacamar, a rare and range-restricted species! Hopefully with some luck we will see this amazing bird. A trail along the riverbank is a great place to call for Bare-crowned Antbird, Little Tinamou, and Red-billed Scythebill.

Nuevo Vigia sits along the banks of the river, surrounded by mature secondary forest, ponds, and forest lagoons to explore! Around the village, we will scan the open areas for Spectacled Parrotlet, Black Oropendola, Striped Cuckoo, and Chestnut-fronted and Blue-and-yellow Macaws. The community maintains a small trail system through the forest, which leads us to a tranquil forest lagoon. Golden-headed Manakin, Double-banded Graytail, Royal Flycatcher, Gray-cheeked Nunlet, and many other forest birds are likely. At the lagoon we hope to see Green-and-rufous Kingfisher, and Capped and Agami Herons! We will head back to the village and find a shady spot to have lunch.

The local artisans weave beautiful baskets, plates, and masks from dried palm leaves, colored with natural dyes from the forest plants and fruits, and carve cocobolo wood and tagua nuts into animals from the area. You are welcome to admire and purchase these Darien handicrafts, directly from the artisans themselves. After our visit at the village, we will continue to explore the trails and open areas of this fantastic area of Darien! Dinner at Canopy Camp.

February 3: Quebrada Felix & Tierra Nueva Foundation

We have another exciting morning ahead of us! We will be birding at Quebrada Felix, along the edge of the Filo del Tallo Hydrological Reserve. As we make our way to the border of the forest, we pass through open fields where Blue-headed Parrot, Plumbeous Kite, Orange-crowned Oriole, and Crane Hawk are commonly seen, among others. A short trail will lead us to a winding streambed through tall canopy mature forest. As we walk slowly along the rocky creek, we will listen and watch for Black-crowned Antpitta, Scaly-throated Leaf-tosser, White-fronted Nunbird, the endemic Stripe-cheeked Woodpecker, Speckled Mourner, Rufous-winged Antwren, Ornate Hawk-Eagle, Fasciated Tiger-Heron, and Golden-crowned Spadebill. Even the rare Solitary Eagle has been seen here! We are sure to have a great morning. Lunch at Canopy Camp.

This afternoon we are off to Tierra Nueva Foundation. The foundation operates a technical high school focusing in applications in agriculture and sustainable farming in Darien. The large property hosts a variety of habitats including mature secondary forest where we will walk a short trail to look for Golden-green Woodpecker, Spot-crowned Barbet, Purple-throated Fruitcrow, Slaty-backed Forest-Falcon, Cinereous Becard, White-eared Conebill, Bay Wren, Black-bellied Wren, Chestnut-backed Antbird (eastern race which shows white spots on the wings), the magnificent Great Curassow, and King Vulture, among others. Dinner at Canopy Camp.

February 4: San Francisco Reserve and return to Panama City

We will have some time before breakfast to enjoy the Canopy Camp birds one last time—families of White-headed Wrens jaunt around the forest edges and Scaly-breasted and Violet-bellied hummingbirds visit the nectar feeders. After breakfast, we will say our goodbyes to the Canopy Camp and make our way back toward Panama City. Along the way, we will stop at San Francisco Nature Reserve, a privately owned forest reserve protecting 1,300 acres. The reserve serves as a wildlife refuge and protects the headwaters of the major rivers in the area. Open fields, ponds, marshland, and streams, mature secondary and even pockets of primary forest are found in the reserve, and it is home to hundreds of species of birds. We will walk the wide road and check out some of the forest trails for Sirystes, Bare-crowned Antbird, White-fronted Nunbird, Great Jacamar, Russet-winged Schiffornis, Royal Flycatcher, Rufous Piha, Central American Pygmy-Owl, Black-and-white Hawk-Eagle, the endemic Yellow-green Tyrannulet, Boat-billed Heron, Blue and Plain-breasted Ground-Doves, and many others. Even the rare Wing-banded Antbird has been recorded here! We will have lunch in Torti, and with full stomachs, make our way back to Panama City, where we will end our Panama birding adventure! Dinner and overnight at Riande Aeropuerto Hotel.

TERMS: To register for a tour or workshop please complete the above registration form and sign below to acknowledge the terms. Send this form along with you Tour/Workshop Registration Form and your deposit or full tour amount to Sabrewing Nature Tours (SNT) at the below address. Registrations will be processed on a first come first served basis. We will place your name on the waiting list if your tour is full.

The deposit for this trip is \$1,000 per participant. Deposits and all signed forms are required to secure registration of your spot on the tour. Deposits are refundable less a 20% processing fee ONLY if the spot can be filled with another participant at the full tour price. Deposits received after a tour has filled will be returned and your name will be placed on a waiting list. Payment in full is due at least 90 days prior to the start of the tour. Registrants who have not paid their remaining balance will forfeit their deposit and their place on the tour. Payment by personal check is strongly preferred. If you would like to pay with a credit card, additional fees will apply. We strongly suggest you consider trip insurance to cover you in the event of a medical or other emergency that would prohibit you from joining the tour.

The activity level required for each tour will be described on the tour page. If in doubt please contact SNT to determine if a tour is right for you. Any physical or medical concerns including allergies and/or dietary restrictions should be communicated to SNT. All tours will be non-smoking during group activities including but not limited to meals, slide programs, vehicle travel and when birding/photographing in close proximity to other participants. Tour groups will be kept small for the enjoyment of all participants. Target group sizes are listed in each tour description on our web site. SNT reserves the right to exceed the target group size by no more than one participant.

Tours will be held regardless of weather conditions. Severe weather may dictate informal discussion and/or a slide program while we wait for the weather to break. Tours will begin at the scheduled time. Tardiness may result in missing the boat, or van so to speak. There are no guarantees in nature. Tours are designed to coincide with excellent nature viewing opportunities. Decisions will be made daily to determine where the group should be to maximize opportunities. Deviation from the scheduled itinerary may be necessary.

It is imperative that all participants follow rules and suggestions set forth by the leaders and/or local guides. Failure to comply could pose a safety risk to you or other tour participants. For the safety of all clients we reserve the right to restrict access to tour functions at any time.

Airfare is NOT included in the price of the tour unless otherwise noted on the tour page. Suggestions on exposure modes, camera settings and a variety of techniques will be verbalized throughout the tour. Do bring your camera's manual. Every camera is unique in its operation thus it is impossible to know every feature of every camera model. Participants will be put in the best locations to take advantage of the light, wind, and habitat. We will work to improve compositions and make suggestions to vary your perspective that will improve your resulting images. Participants will also learn techniques to successfully capture action and behavior images.

Waiver: I am aware that certain risks and dangers are inherent to nature travel and photography and may occur during a Sabrewing Nature Tours event and that such risk and dangers cannot be eliminated without diminishing the quality of the workshop/tour for which I have registered.
